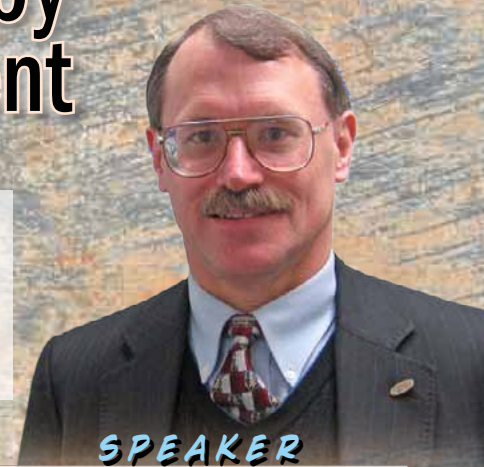

Imagining Korea's Future by Reflecting on its Past & Present

DAVID SATTERWHITE

A talk & discussion with Dr. David Satterwhite. Dr. Satterwhite has served for 7 years as the Executive Director of the Japan-U.S. Educational Commission (Fulbright Japan), and has lived in Japan for over 40 years, but has had a 39-year association and fascination with Korea, earning both his MA and Ph.D. degrees in Korean Studies.

Tensions on the Korean peninsula have risen precariously over the past year, with speculation of renewed hostilities, a "Second Korean War", and concerns over nuclear ambitions and leadership succession, among others. Considering these issues in historical context, Satterwhite shifts our attention from heightened tensions to much-needed efforts at reconciliation, reminding us that the division of Korea in 1945 was intended to be temporary, and the road to Korea's future is not a divided highway.
