Justin Tilman will describe NASA's four core missions of human spaceflight, science, exploration, and aeronautics and how NASA and Japan are cooperating in each of these areas. From astronauts working together onboard the International Space Station, to joint U.S.-Japan satellites exploring the Moon, the Sun and the Earth, to joint work on cutting edge aeronautics research, NASA and Japan are working together on more than 40 joint projects in space exploration. Justin Tilman will talk about these projects and prospects for exciting future missions to destinations such as asteroids and Mars.

Since 2007, Justin Tilman has served as the NASA Attaché at the U.S. Embassy Tokyo and as NASA's Representative in Asia. Previously, he served in a number of NASA international program management positions at NASA Headquarters in Washington DC and at the Johnson Space Center in Houston. Originally from Kansas City, Missouri, he speaks Japanese and has graduate and undergraduate degrees in international relations and Japan studies. When not staring at the stars, he enjoys exploring Japan with his wife and two children.
